Carol Goodloe (May 2019)

Carol Goodloe has served on the AOEA Board for 3 years, and volunteered with the AOEA for several years before joining the Board. Carol has loved the Outdoor Lab since she first visited with her sons more than 20 years ago. As an outdoor enthusiast, Carol believes in the benefits of outdoor education, and believes the Outdoor Lab needs to be fully supported by Arlington Public Schools. Michael Nardolilli (May 2019)

Michael Nardolilli is an experienced nonprofit executive with a long love affair with the outdoors. Growing up in his native Jersey City, Mr. Nardolilli

helped to preserve what is now Lincoln Park West and to assemble the property that became Liberty State Park. After a successful 18-year career as a corporate litigator, Mr. Nardoilli became President of the Northern Virginia Conservation Trust where he created six public parks and preserved over 5,400 acres of Northern Virginia from development. As President of the C&O Canal Trust, Mr. Nardoilli tripled the Trust's annual donations to the C&O Canal National Historical Park and received the Chairman's Award for Achievement from the President's Advisory Council for Historic Preservation for the Trust's "Canal Quarters" program.

Mr. Nardolilli's current activities include service as Vice Chairman of the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority and as Executive Director of the Montgomery Parks Foundation. He is the recipient of numerous awards, including being named by Washington Life Magazine as a "Green City Leader" in 2011 and as a "Hometown Hero" by WETA in 2007.

Anita Scott (May 2019)

Anita K. Scott has seen the Outdoor Lab grow from its infancy and has many memories to share. As one of Phoebe's 5 children, she grew up with a great love of and appreciation for nature and the great outdoors. After graduating from W-L here in Arlington, she earned her BA in English from Westhampton College, taught school for more than 33 years in Arlington (mostly at Williamsburg), and in 1988 received her MA in Humanities from Marymount University.

It is very exciting for her to see the second and even third generations of Arlington students come out to the Lab, especially since it is increasingly important in our digital world for our children to spend time learning outside.

What's Happening at the Lab?



In other exciting Lab news, Munch the snapping turtle's new aquarium has arrived! With help from your donations, the AOEA was able to purchase a substantially larger aquarium for our growing snapping turtle. Munch the snapping turtle (Chelydra serpentina) is one of the many fascinating members of our Animal Lab.



MUNCH!

The position of Munch's aquarium in the Animal Lab allows students to gather on either side and watch her at their eye level as she displays her unique feeding behavior. Snapping turtles are omnivores and scavengers, consuming both plant and animal material, whether alive or deceased. They will eat invertebrates, fish, reptiles, and even small mammals. In addition to its powerful beak, a snapping turtle rapidly lunges its head forward, expanding its oral cavity to create a vacuum to suck its prey into its mouth.

Student Conservation Association (SCA) Trail Work at the Outdoor Lab

Last Summer the AOEA spent \$35,000 for a three-week residential group to perform trail work at the Lab. It was a terrific experience for the participants and provided much needed attention to the trails. The AOEA plans to continue having SCA return again this summer to continue improving the OL trails. Provided below is the report that the SCA wrote on their experience at the Lab.

Executive Summary

The Outdoor Lab (OL) is a facility that provides science and outdoor education opportunities to the students of Arlington County Public Schools. Amidst the 225-acre property, there are three miles of trails that are used for various nature hikes and recreation. We were given the task of improving the Pine Mountain Trail, with a focus on making one section of this trail safer and easier for students to hike. The OL has had no significant trail maintenance done on this part of the trail since it was built by the Potomac Appalachian Trail Club in 1977.

We removed or leveled pointy, dangerous rocks out of the tread, installed stone steps and a staircase (made of an additional eight stone steps), and improved trail drainage by building drainage structures and enhancing the outslope of the trail. Several members of the OL staff were able to hike the trail towards the end of our time working there. The staff was pleased with the improvements being made and was grateful that a previously dreaded section of the trail is now more accessible and achievable for everyone.

SCA - Student Conservation Assocation

The mission of SCA is to build the next generation of conservation leaders and inspire lifelong stewardship of our environment and communities by engaging young people in hands-on service to the land. SCA was founded in 1957 by Elizabeth Putnam, a college student with a big dream. While at Vassar College, she developed her senior thesis around the concept that a commonsense solution to the abuse and under-maintenance of America's treasured public lands would be putting to good use the energy, talent and hard work of a force of youthful volunteers.

In the intervening 56 years, SCA has deployed a force of more than 70,000 members, completing 26 million hours of conservation service in 550 parks, forests, wildlife refuges and urban green spaces at the national, regional, state and municipal level in all 50 states.

The SCA Conservation Corps program serves the communities

and land throughout the nation by accomplishing significant conservation service projects that enhance and protect natural areas and by providing educational opportunities to promote the understanding, protection and stewardship of these natural areas. The four programmatic outcomes are taken directly from the mission: Service, Leadership, Conservation and Stewardship.

Service is the hands-on experience and skills that SCA members need to perform conservation based work on and for our partners and the land.

Leadership is about creating positive and safe experiences; developing self-awareness and understanding one's personal strengths and limitations; supporting individuals and groups to maximize their accomplishments; and developing the management and decision-making skills to unite people and resources towards a common goal.

Conservation is the foundation of SCA's mission to shape environmentally focused leaders and stewards. This begins with a basic understanding of the natural world and our interaction, relationship, and impact on it. Furthermore, SCA members should develop an understanding and appreciation for the history and ethic of the conservation movement and how it influences decisions now and for the future.

Stewardship is the commitment to care for one's complex and diverse community- human and natural - and the ethic and action that support continued health and use in the future.

Member Outcomes

None of the crew members had done trail work in the past, most of them had never camped so intensively, and some had never even slept in a tent before. The crew grew by leaps and bounds in their knowledge of the outdoors, conservation practices and trail skills.

One member who had not spent much time outdoors prior to this project eagerly dove in and learned everything he could about camping and the wilderness. For more experienced campers, it was still a challenge to learn to camp with such a large group in only one campsite for three weeks.

We had to practice the seven Leave No Trace (LNT) ethics during our time at the Outdoor Lab in order to leave our campsite and work area natural. The LNT way of camping was new to some of our crew members and got them thinking about our impact as conservation workers on the land. The members will hopefully continue to practice LNT in their future outdoor adventures.



Trail Work! That's a big rock!

During our last week on this project, a group of summer camp students from the OL were able to hike the trail while we were working on it. The crew members set up stations around our worksite to share their knowledge of trail work with the campers. In addition to sharing about their SCA experience, the members also focused on explaining the purposes of the steps and drain dips that they had installed. They also highlighted one of the crush stations and shared how local resources are used to create new trail structures.

The campers benefited from learning about SCA and were inspired by the "cool" high school students doing trail work. The crew members also benefited from getting to know the population that would use this trail in the future as well as affirming their trail maintenance knowledge through effective communication with their audience.

Because of this experience with SCA, many of the crew members are thinking of pursuing another opportunity to serve on a crew with SCA or AmeriCorps. Many members exhibited the knowledge, traits, and ambitions that would make excellent leaders in this field.
